Information about the visit.

Your questions answered:

What is the purpose of the visits?

To offer a professional development opportunity for Early Years, Primary and Secondary teachers; to visit South India and gain first hand experiences of life in a developing country; to experience and explore a culture which is very different to our own; to explore local development issues; to share the learning with children back in the UK; and to broaden the global dimension in schools. The visit is open to any teachers who share the objectives above.

What are the dates of the visit?

This visit will take place from 3rd – 14th August, 2013. (Ten days in India is needed for a productive visit, plus two days travelling).

Who is the visit being organised by?

What is Sangam?

Sangam is a small residential education centre in Silvepura, a village 20 miles north of Bangalore. The centre works with local schools, and welcomes visiting teacher and student-teacher groups. Please see details on www.sangamprojects.com


Imogen and Kiran Sahi run Sangam. Kiran teaches art and design and has developed "the Land" into a place for enabling learning. He was born in Silvepura and understands development and change in the area with rare insider's knowledge. He is skilled at interpreting and explaining India to those visiting from other parts of the world. Imogen taught Biology and Geography in a Comprehensive School in Surrey, and was a Leading Science teacher, before moving to India. She has recently been appointed as an

Education Training Consultant for the British Council.

Where will the group stay?

The group will stay at Sangam which has accommodation for up to 10 people. The centre is built in a large wooded garden on the edge of the rural village of Silvepura. The accommodation is simple but comfortable and is based on the assumption that guests are happy to share rooms, with a maximum of three people per room. Although there are some western comforts and amenities the centre is predominantly south Indian in style.





What will the weather be like?

The weather will be warm (in the mid 20s) and possibly a bit wet in the evenings as it is the start of the monsoon - so warm and dry most of the day with some possible evening storms. Sometimes (like last year) it will not rain at all until September, but you never can tell.

What should we bring?

During the preparation meeting before you travel you will be advised about kit lists, tips for travelling to India and how to get a visa for India. It will also be a chance for you to ask questions and meet the rest of the group. During that meeting we will also discuss what your interests and curriculum needs are so we can begin to form the precise programme for your visit, which leads on to the next question:

What will we do?

The exact programme for each study visit is negotiated with the group and is based around your curriculum interests, so every visit is therefore always slightly different. Activities during the visit are curriculum linked, mainly focussing around Geography, History/Knowledge and Understanding of the World; Art/Creativity; RE/PSED. There are many options:

- Investigate the changing nature of the local village, and of Bangalore, in response to rapid development.
- Gather resources for a contrasting locality study.
- Experience daily life in and around the village.
- Learn about important environmental issues e.g. water.
- Visits to local schools and possibilities of developing partnerships.
- Explore ways in which different schools approach themes such as sustainability in creative ways.
- Take part in day trips to places such as a local farming and spice market, different Hindu and Jain temples, local folk shrines, a nearby medicinal plant centre, and nature walks to local sites of interest.
- Cultural Workshops to learn about Indian artistic rituals, traditional patterning, folk dances, festivals and folk myths and stories.
- Other cross curricular activities according to the interests of the group e.g. an introduction to Indian cookery, yoga, to the many religions of south India, Indian craft activities, artistic activities relating to Indian rituals and mandalas.



What is the cost?

The cost in total is the price of the flight to India, plus £600 to cover the course fee. The exact cost will therefore depend on available prices when we book (flights are currently around £550 - £600). The course fee covers all briefing, preparation and admin costs, accommodation at Sangam, food, in-country transport, study resources, workshops in India and visits in and around Bangalore. It does not cover costs of travel from your home to Heathrow Airport, costs of vaccinations for travel, malaria pills if needed, travel insurance, and a visa for entry to India. We will discuss all these aspects during the preparation sessions.
